"Product of Canada" or "Made in Canada"

"Products of Canada" are subject to a threshold of 98% Canadian content.

"Made in Canada" products are subject to a threshold of 51% Canadian content; accompanied by a qualifying statement indicating that the product contains imported content, such as "Made in Canada with imported parts," or "Made in Canada with 60% Canadian content and 40% imported content."

For both, the product must have undergone its "last substantial transformation" in Canada. *Competition Act, June 23, 2022*

It's Tax Time! Canada Revenue Agency— Medical Expenses

The 2024 rate for Alberta residents is 54.5 cents/km. Travel must be a minimum of 80 km (return trip).

Are you thinking about buying more Canadian made products?



Websites and barcode-scanning apps are being created to help consumers search store shelves for Canadian made items. Here is information about apps and websites that you may be interested in using:

The Maple Scan app helps shoppers identify Canadian products by analyzing photographs of products to provide details about where they were made and whether they meet the government criteria for being labelled "product of Canada" or "made in Canada." When the app detects a product from outside the country, it offers users a list of homegrown alternatives.

The Shop Canadian app is a fast way to get product information by scanning barcodes. The app makes it easy to support Canadian businesses by giving access to the company and location info on consumer products. With a tap, you might be able to discover whether a product is locally made, further enabling your buying choice.

Buy Beaver is an app that scans the barcodes of everyday products to instantly discover how authentically Canadian they are. The app recommends alternative options with higher local content, empowering you to support Canadian-made products.

Check the Label is an app that helps Canadian consumers make informed decisions about the products they buy, helping verify whether the products they buy are made in Canada. The app allows users to scan a product's barcode and instantly see its origin.

Made in CA is a website <u>https://madeinca.ca/</u> founded in 2018, the website started compiling a list of products and services made in Canada—so consumers could feel confident that their dollars were making the greatest possible impact on the Canadian economy. The website recognizes that how "Canadian" a product is can vary—whether it's based on ownership, sourcing of raw materials, or where it's manufactured. The goal is to present as much information as possible and let the consumer decide.

6-WEEK WONDERS—by Paul Boisvert



In 1954, during the fall sitting of the Alberta Legislature the EMERGENCY TEACHER TRAINING ACT passed, directing the University of Alberta to establish a program which would allow persons to take teacher training while being allowed to teach. The program was divided into 3 segments of 6 weeks each and were held during July and August. After successfully completing the first segment, one was issued a LETTER OF AU-THORITY (LA) which allowed one to seek a teaching position in Alberta. To continue to hold a valid LA, one had to successfully complete the next segment during the following summer. After completing the third segment and teaching for a third year, one would be granted a temporary teaching certificate for 2 years. Subsequently, upon the recommendation of a Superintendent of Schools, one would receive a permanent teacher certificate. Many of those who began their teaching career went on to use many routes to acquire courses which would eventually lead to a professional certificate and beyond. The program ended in August 1959.

It should be noted that the Education Ministry were not upset by the fact that some jurisdictions (especially the cities) refused to hire any of these "6-week wonders "as the real shortage of teachers was in the rural areas. The ATA also was not enamored by the program and for 3 years refused to have these teachers as participants in the pension plan and receiving salary increments. However, many rural jurisdictions paid an increment but smaller than fully certificated teachers.

While many of the participants were recent high school graduates, a significant number were immigrants to Canada who had foreign credentials which were not deemed satisfactory for this province.

Two factors precipitated the shortage in the mid-1950's. The baby boom following the end of WWII as Canadian military personnel returned from postings abroad and the large influx of immigration by what were called Displaced Persons (DP's).

Today, with the pressures imposed by uncontrolled immigration and changes to school programs laced with unrealistic expectations, many teachers are leaving the profession early while fewer are choosing teaching as a profession. A clear understanding of how this situation will be remedied has not been clearly spelled out by those with authority to lead public education.
