Retirement has not slowed down Susan. She continues to be a passionate, energetic community member and educator. When asked about her job of choice as an educator, she remained thoughtful for a moment and then replied, "I've liked all of them ... I just love teaching ... all ages ... all subjects." She added that being a teacher offered the opportunity for change every few years; she has loved taking on a variety of challenges as well as continuing to be a learner. Susan reflected on one experience - teaching home economics. She found it especially rewarding when her students were able to create basic meals for their families.

Susan retired in June 2010 as principal of Valhalla Community School. The passage into retirement only led her to more opportunities to be a community volunteer and to pursue a retirement career as an instructor in Teacher Education North at GPRC.

She adds, "... they [teachers] need to create personal relationships with every child and every parent ... parents send us their best" and teachers help these children "be the best they can be".
