First changes to STARTA: As you know, one of our leaders, colleague and friend, Janet Kiriakides, passed away suddenly after a brief but painful fight with pancreatic cancer. We looked to the executive for help in taking over Janet's duties. Wendy Poirier, our current Membership and Contact Co-Ordinator, was appointed by the executive to fill the position of Co-President of STARTA on a temporary basis. Ardyth Garrinson has offered to take over Janet's role in assisting with the News Bulletin. Thank you to both ladies for stepping up to help – it is much appreciated!

We are pleased to welcome Wendy Poirier as Interim Co-President of the St. Albert Retired Teachers Association (STARTA).

Wendy Poirier was a high school Physical Education, Math, French, Health, and English teacher for 35 years in Saskatchewan and Alberta.

Wendy began teaching in 1978 at a four-room high school in Yellowgrass, Saskatchewan. After one year she went on to spend fifteen years in Regina Public Schools and four years in Southeast Regional College in Qu'Appelle. While in Qu'Appelle, Wendy taught an Indigenous Women's High School Program to women, from the Gordon and Sintaluta Reserves. During this time, she gained considerable knowledge and insight into residential schools and life on a reserve from her indigenous students. The Poirier family moved to St. Albert in 1999 and Wendy started teaching in Edmonton Public Schools. She retired as a teacher in 2012 and became the Co-Ordinator of the Rental Assistance Program for St. Albert Food Bank and Community Village until she fully retired in 2015.

Wendy joined St. Albert Retired Teachers Association (STARTA) in 2012; and has actively served as Membership Contact since 2016. On February 08, 2022, Wendy Poirier was appointed Interim Co-President of STARTA.

The executive also thanks Ardyth Garrison for volunteering to help Peggy with the STARTA News Bulletin. Thank you Ardyth!

Ardyth started teaching in the mid 70's and spread her teaching career of 30+ years across 7 different schools in the St. Albert Protestant Separate School District. What an amazing teaching and school career Ardyth has had! Beginning as Special Support for Grade 1 students, all the way to teaching Math 10, and becoming an Assistant Principal and then Principal! Even after retiring in 2006, Ardyth took on a new role as a University Facilitator for Student Teachers. Shortly after her retirement, Ardyth joined STARTA, and in 2014, she joined the executive as Co-Vice President, then Co-President, then Co-Past president. We are delighted to tap her many experiences and great literary skills as she now joins us in creating and editing the monthly News Bulletins!

One Dog's Expedition By Jean Elder

What joy for me when my dog, Julie, came into my life a year ago. Previously she had to survive on her own in a wilderness area likely since she was a few months old. She is a petite, medium-sized dog. At the time of my adopting her, she was almost a year old and already had a litter of pups. Julie was super thin, had a very unhealthy coat, and was extremely fearful of people, of being in a house, of dogs, of cars, of a city. The fast pace of St. Albert was traumatizing. A leash was too confining and threatening. What brought Julie excitement and joy was when my friend, Susan, visited with her large, Labradormix dog, Hozhoni. She is also a rescue dog, probably six years old. She was and is a guardian angel, mother and teacher for Julie.

The second day that I had Julie, I decided to take her to my vet for a check-up. Julie was in the back seat of my car. When I opened the driver's door, she shot past me and ran! It didn't matter where as long as she could escape. I watched in unbelievable horror as she dashed across four lanes of traffic on Hebert Road. No thought to where she was going – anywhere but this insane city. She was terrified. Immediately my vet put out an alert on his website and on Facebook. Thank goodness I had a photo of her.

Julie was spotted at Campbell Park, about three kilometres away. I called the RCMP detachment, where the centre for animal control is. The media warned of a dog on the loose. Four Peace Officers came to the rescue. Julie headed back west and multiple times crossed six lanes of very busy traffic on St. Albert Trail. The officers had to stop traffic for the safety of drivers and Julie. At one point she was in behind Sorrentino's restaurant but was too elusive for the officers to catch her. She ran down Salisbury Avenue and then back and forth across St. Albert Trail. In the meantime, several people were driving around trying to find her. She wore a bright pink collar but had no tags or other identification. She didn't even know her name. I was numb with fear and disbelief. Was this a horrendous nightmare or a trip to outer space gone awry? My only recourse was to pray to Julie's guardian angel that she would watch over her and bring her back safely. The Peace Officers didn't give up.

Eventually Julie ran behind St. Albert Inn into a construction site which was fenced in and this is where she was captured. She didn't put up a fight. She surrendered. After several hours of running and trauma, she just couldn't go on anymore. The officers took her to the vet's office where Susan was waiting. Julie lay under her chair and was not able to comprehend what happened or what would come next in her young life. I am ever so grateful to the Peace Officers. I wanted to thank them publicly in the St. Albert Gazette. My hesitation was that everyone would then know that this was my dog causing so much chaos.



A miracle happened! There was no traffic accident, no one was hurt, and Julie was safe. If she has nine lives, I think she has used up 8.98 of them.

Today Julie is a dog who loves life. She lives with her best dog friend, Hozhoni. Life couldn't be better. She knows that she is well cared for, feels safe and secure, and realizes that this is her home. Her gentle, loving character brings joy to many. Susan said that I got a ten-million dollar dog. How true! She has a special intuitive gift. At a palliative care unit, a patient who loves dogs dearly, was allowed to have Hozhoni and Julie visit her. When Julie came to the door, she made a beeline for the patient and put her head on her lap. Such a natural presence! This action showed a special bond of love. I treasure my ten-million dollar dog!
